**REGISTRATION AND FINANCIAL AID FOR THE 2006-2007 SCHOOL YEAR:**

We are already receiving many calls regarding enrollment for next school year. All financial aid applications and initial screening will be done through a contracted company called FACTS, a specialized company used by most other Catholic schools. There will be a \$20 fee for this application. The application can be sent in the mail or completed online. I have ordered enough applications for any family wishing to receive financial aid. These confidential application materials should be ready for pick-up in late January. The application will survey applicants regarding their financial background and priorities, as well as asking for a copy of your most recent tax returns and W2 forms. Each year over 10 families apply for financial aid. This company will allow us to complete the initial screening process quickly and efficiently. As deadlines are advertised, please complete your application within these dates.

While the cost of education continues to go up, please remain prayerful that we can continue to serve all families through the financial aid process. Please do not lose hope!

## FROM THE VICE PRINCIPAL

### **FINAL EXAMS**

A comprehensive evaluation is given in all Marist classes at the end of each semester. Most classes give an exam at the end of the term: some require comprehensive presentations or projects. These comprehensive measurements are worth 20% of the semester grade.

Exams will be given Monday through Friday, January 23-27 on the following schedule:

Students are required to be on campus only when their exams are given. Two hours are allotted to complete each exam. Students must attend the first hour of each exam taken, but they may leave after that time.

Exams will be administered early or off-schedule only:

- When the student is participating in a scheduled school sponsored event;
- For unavoidable family emergencies;
- For illness.

Family vacations and college trips should be scheduled after finals have been taken. Rescheduled exams should be made up prior to the absence if possible. In cases of illness or emergencies, tests will be scheduled as soon as possible on the student's return during after-school hours. Arrangements must be made with the Vice Principal and not individual teachers.

A \$50.00 fee will be charged for each test for students who miss exams for non-illness/emergency/non-school sponsored reasons.

A student missing an exam for an unexcused absence will receive a zero for the exam grade. Parents of ill students need to call in as usual.

### **SEMESTER GRADES**

First semester grades will be sent late in the week of January 30<sup>th</sup>. Semester grades are the only ones to appear on each student's official transcript (although quarter and semester final grades appear on the report card) and are those reflected in accumulated GPA and class rank.

### **SECOND SEMESTER SCHEDULES**

Second semester schedules will be available for students during the week of January 9<sup>th</sup>. Schedule changes will be made through February 3<sup>rd</sup>. Students may not drop a year-long class at the end of the first semester without teacher recommendation based on lack of skills to continue. Students who have demonstrated the ability to succeed will be encouraged to remain in year-long classes because the school completed scheduling and hiring at the first of the year based on those original requests. If a change is approved, a class change will only be made if another open class will fit into the student's schedule, preferably keeping the same teachers in all other classes.

*No changes can be made for lunch-time or teacher preference.*

**VICE PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE CONT. . .****MANDATORY STUDY**

Students currently enrolled in Mandatory Study are reminded that this session will run through Jan. 20<sup>th</sup> which is the end of second quarter.

**PREPARING FOR FINALS**

Marist continues the tradition of giving finals to prepare students for the college testing process. Graduates return and tell us that they are NOW grateful because many of their fellow college friends have never taken final exams, do not know how to prepare, and are completely thrown by the experience.

Students can enter the experience fully prepared and confident if preparation work is done well ahead of time. Those who have kept good notes and all returned papers/tests will have all they need to prepare. Teachers distribute guidelines and review sheets. Completing those by writing out answers is absolutely the best way to be ready. Careful attention to guidelines for final projects will eliminate last minute scrambles or, worst yet, an after the fact realization that the project was incomplete. Faculty members remain available after school for assistance and clarification. Some run specific study sessions and many students form their own study groups. The only danger with student formed study groups is the challenge to keep on task and the need to be very sure that the materials being studied contain correct information.

It is always interesting to hear a student and/or parent stating afterwards that they cannot understand how a poor grade was achieved when so many hours of study went into the preparation for a test. The question becomes what was really done during those "many hours." Was the phone, visitors, T.V., music, video games, etc. involved in that time? Was there honest effort to focus on the material at hand, were study guides filled out, were text books and lecture notes consulted, was studied material correct? Was studied material correctly stated in the student's notes (once in a conference when a parent verified the vast number of hours her student had studied, we found that the girl had answered that "Italy is an island," which came directly from her inaccurate note-taking.

The old standards of getting sufficient rest and eating well before a test hold true. Good preparation leads to a calm approach which can vastly alleviate "test anxiety." Test anxiety should never be a good excuse for poor achievement and is not a term that anyone should have in their vocabulary. To be nervous and excited is a perfectly normal reaction, but nothing beats confidence in your own abilities based on smart study.

Just as practice is a crucial part of the athlete's training, so is study for winning the test-game.

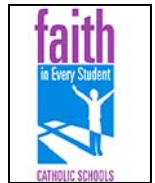

## FINANCIAL AID DEFINED

GENERAL AID TYPES 

**Federal Aid:** Aid that comes from the U.S. government. This aid is usually disbursed through your college.

**Gift Aid:** Financial aid that does not need to be paid back:

- Grants: Typically based on financial need;
- Scholarships: Typically based on achievement or talent.

**Loans:** Funds that must be paid back later, with interest. A loan can be from a private lender (such as a bank) or your college (federal loans are guaranteed by the government).

**Private Aid:** Financial aid that comes from non-government sources.

**Work-Study:** Provides students with part-time employment. More under "Federal Work-Study."

LOAN TERMS 

**Annual percentage rate (APR):** Amount of interest (fee for borrowing money) associated with a loan. APR can change or remain the same during the year and term of the loan. If the interest rate is variable, the rate can change; if it is fixed, the rate will not change.

**Co-signer:** A person besides the borrower who signs a credit agreement and is legally obligated to repay the loan if the borrower does not make payments.

**Default:** Failure to repay your loan. It may lead to legal action to recover the money and can affect your credit rating.

FINANCIAL AID TERMS 

**Dependency Status:** Based on government standards, if you are considered a dependent student, colleges will consider parent financial resources when awarding financial aid.

**FAFSA:** Free Application for Federal Student Aid. The form they use to determine the amount of federal and state aid for which you are eligible.

**Financial Need:** The difference between your educational costs and the EFC (Expected Family Contribution—the amount your family is expected to pay).

FEDERAL AID PROGRAMS 

**Pell Grant:** Gift aid given based on financial need. How much aid you will be eligible to receive is based on your FAFSA results. Current max/yr is \$4,050.

**Federal Work-Study:** Provides jobs for students with financial need, allowing them to earn money to help defray college expenses. Jobs are available both on and off campus.

**Perkins Loan:** Fixed low interest (5 percent) loan through your college. You must demonstrate financial need. Current max/yr for undergrads is \$4,000 (max. total: \$20,000).

**Stafford Loan:** Variable interest rate loan. Stafford loans may be obtained from a private lender or your college. They can be either subsidized (no interest accrues while in school) or unsubsidized (interest accrues while in school).

**Delinquent:** When at least one loan payment is late or missed. Serious delinquency results in default.

**Disbursement:** Release of funds by a lender to the borrower.

**Grace period:** The time between when you leave school and before repayment begins.

**Principal:** The full amount borrowed. During repayment it refers to the portion of the original amount still owed (not including interest).

**Promissory note:** A contract between the borrower and lender that reflects the terms and conditions under which the borrower promises to repay the loan.

**Financial Aid Package:** The total financial aid you are offered, including scholarships, grants, work-study and loans. This information is typically summarized in an award letter. You may choose which aid you would like to accept.

**Professional Judgment:** Financial aid administrators may adjust your aid package and contribution when extenuating circumstances exist (i.e., loss of a parent, unemployment, unpaid medical expenses, etc.).

**Verification:** Review process in which the financial aid office requests documentation to verify the accuracy of FAFSA data (on average, about 1/3 of all applications are selected).

**NEW CLASS BEING OFFERED SPRING SEMESTER**

There is a new class being offered in the Spring Semester for students who must satisfy an art credit: Art History/Humanities. The course is recommended to college-minded Juniors and Seniors who might consider studying abroad in countries such as Italy, Spain, Greece, or France.

Art History/Humanities is a study of the evolving cultures in Ancient Greece up to the Modern Period where we meet painters like Picasso and Dali. This class may appeal to students interested in several different areas of academic study, as it is an interdisciplinary course. We will study the historical context of art; read pieces of literature that reflect the climate of the times; research scientists and other creative masters that pioneered modern thinking; and study the social and political movements in several different periods throughout history. Students with interest in the following subjects might particularly benefit from Art History: English/Language Arts, Art History/Humanities, and the sciences.

The goals of the course are as follows:

1. To inspire students to travel abroad.
2. To satisfy an art credit for students who are daunted by creating their own.
3. To give students an in-depth experience of the life and culture of several different periods throughout history.
4. To expose students to a variety of pieces of literature not otherwise addressed in the English/Language Arts curriculum.
5. To reinforce concepts learned in World History and other such courses.

While there are no prerequisites for this class, it is recommended to upper-classmen who are seriously interested in using their knowledge obtained from previous academic courses at Marist. If you have questions, please see Mr. Stone or Ms. Lauren Schmidt.
