### FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

On behalf of the Archdiocese of Portland, I am pleased to announce Mr. Perry Martin as the new Principal at Marist High School. Perry comes to us from Sacred Heart Catholic School in Medford, where he has been the Principal for the past seven years. He earned his administrative certificate from Trenton State College in Trenton, New Jersey, and earned both his Bachelor of Science and Masters Degrees from Western Oregon University.

The Admissions team has completed in excess of 160 interviews with prospective ninth grade students for the 2004-2005 school year, with one placement test yet to be given on Saturday, May 1st. After this testing, our interview numbers should exceed 175 students. The Foundation Scholarship Committee will be meeting toward the end of this month to review applications and make financial awards. The Admissions Committee at the high school will follow this closely so that we can move forward with firm numbers for the next school year. We hope to have these processes completed by mid-May to better assist people with their financial plans for next year. If you have not completed a FACTS form you can do so through October, 2005. This needs to be done before assistance can be considered.

May 15th is the annual Auction sponsored by the Marist Foundation. This is a very important event where proceeds go to help with the financial support for Marist High School. I would like to thank all of you in advance for your support of this event.



Testing students are not required to attend classes on the day of their test(s), but regular dress code applies. Students taking afternoon tests need to prepare to stay late and arrange transportation if necessary. Students are not allowed to make phone calls during the testing time and all students will be dismissed together and cannot leave early.

## COMPUTER LITERACY REQUIREMENT:

There has been a subtle change in the computer literacy graduation requirement. Students who have advanced computer skills can opt to test out of the Computer Lit class. Information about the test content is on line. Students who test successfully are then encouraged to enroll in advanced technology classes, but not required to do so.

### FINAL DECISION: COLLEGE CHOICE

You have already narrowed your college choices. Here are some tips to help you make a final decision.

#### 10 QUESTIONS TO ASK BEFORE PICKING A COLLEGE

- What different financial aid packages does the school offer? Remember to factor in costs such as transportation home, long distance calls, etc.
- 2. Is the program you're interested in offered?
- 3. How many graduates find jobs in their field of study?
- 4. How does the school help graduates find jobs?
- 5. How easy is it to get the courses you want at the times that are convenient for you?
- 6. How much does housing cost, and is finding off-campus housing difficult?
- 7. What is the quality of academic resources (library, research facilities, computer labs, etc.)? Are they up-to-date and accessible?
- 8. What is the retention rate (how many students come back after their freshman year)?
- 9. What student organizations are on campus?
- 10. What sort of career planning or job placement services are available?







#### **COLLEGE TOURS: DECIDING FACTOR?**

#### Before You Go:

- Pick a typical day (preferably a weekday) to visit where you can get a feel for the environment.
- If possible, stay overnight. You can talk to other students and see what life on campus is really like.
- Create a list of questions specific to each school.

#### On Campus:

- Take a guided tour and go to informational sessions to get an overview of what the school is all about.
- Go to class. Note size, instructors, competition.
- Do the dorm rooms, cafeteria and campus facilities such as the library, computer labs and health and recreational facilities meet your expectations?
- Explore the college surroundings and ask yourself if it's an environment where you'll be comfortable. Do you feel safe?

## COMPARING FINANCIAL AID AWARD **LETTERS**

You may receive award letters from different colleges. Keep the following in mind when making your final decision:

- Look carefully at your award letters: Letters from different schools will probably have their figures and costs in different formats. Compare award letters to see how their offers measure up. Ask if outside scholarships will affect your aid.
- Compare loan offers: Interest rates, how interest compounds, repayment terms and cancellation provisions can vary widely from loan-to-loan.
- Compare affordability of aid offers over time: Ask how your financial aid package will change over time. The aid package made available to you in your senior year may look very different from the one you were offered freshman



#### FAST TIP

You can choose to accept or decline any part of your financial aid package.

#### "NOT SO OBVIOUS" COLLEGE QUESTIONS:

Asking about these potential issues early could mean not dealing with them later in the year.

#### Academics:

- ⇒ Are there any tutoring services available? Check when they're available.
- ⇒ How easy is it to switch majors? Switching majors could mean spending more time in school.
- ⇒ How will your AP/previous college credits transfer over? Can previously earned courses take care of lower level requirements?

#### College Cost:

- ⇒ How much are books and other materials going to **cost?** Are used items available?
- ⇒ What is the average increase in tuition and other costs from year to year? View at least three years' worth of data to chart past increases.
- ⇒ Can you get a refund if you have to drop out? Find out the procedures if you unexpectedly have to miss class time.
- ⇒ What are the opportunities for employment on or near campus? Finding a job close to campus could mean doing without the expense of a car.

#### Living on Campus:

- ⇒ What is the policy on dorm room wear and tear? What damage are you responsible for?
- ⇒ What kind of food is served in the cafeteria? Check out your options when the cafeteria is closed.
- ⇒ What is the school's method of matching roommates? What if you want to switch?
- ⇒ What kind of health facilities and services does the college offer? 24-hour emergency care? Nearest hospital?

Please sign and return the contracts to the attention of the BUSINESS OFFICE upon receipt. If you have or intend to apply for financial aid or a scholarship, your contract will not be available until award notifications have been sent out.


## **AN EXPERIENCE OF A LIFETIME!**
